Task 1:

Prepare a glossary for the following terms and include examples. You will find definitions on the internet, and the University College London Internet Grammar of English (IGE) app (the related website is very useful too: <http://www.ucl.ac.uk/internet-grammar/>). You MUST NOT copy and paste definitions from the internet – you will be assessed on your ability to orally explain the terminology without using your notes for reference and to give examples.
